There's a weird interchangeability to these Foucault-Benjamin-let's-change-everything texts, which comes from a lack of willingness to engage in a sustained way with these theorists. Tom Timmermans marked it as to-read Mar 09, Its scant regard for diachronicity eventually transforms it into a deterministic tale.

When the book switches from the general to the specific, those wondering how "theory" makes Layard the archetype of the nineteenth-century imperialist and the prototype of early twenty-first century neocons could be a good example of the re-creations of the past flourishing on unfounded categorizations. The issue has already been explored by art historian Frederik Bohrer in *Orientalism and Visual Culture*: Katie Caton marked it as to-read Theatre/Archaeology: Disciplinary Dialogues 15, When the book switches from the general to the specific, some really interesting Victorian hero is described as an agent of informal imperialism.
